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Second Annual Report from the Provincial Paediatric Therapy Consultant (PPTC) 2005-2006

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Background

The Provincial Paediatric Therapy Consultant is a contract position funded by the Ministry of Children and Family Development. The Consultant is part of an interdisciplinary approach to address issues in physical, occupational, and speech therapy services for children in British Columbia, particularly recruitment and retention of paediatric therapists. Improved ability to recruit and retain paediatric therapists across this province will result in better access to therapy services that support children with special needs to achieve their full potential and ability to participate in all aspects of community life. The Consultant works under the direction of the Steering Committee for the BC Provincial Consultant for Paediatric Therapists, comprised of representatives from Physical Therapy, Occupational Therapy, Speech-Language Pathology and the Ministry of Children and Family Development.

Work Plan Objectives and Accomplishments

To guide the work of the Consultant, the Steering Committee created the following vision: *BC will be the province of choice for paediatric therapists.* The Objectives developed in June 2005 for the work plan for 2005-2006 included:

Provide a meaningful voice for paediatric therapists across British Columbia to inform decision-making processes that affect child, family, and community outcomes.

Activities & Achievements

- Connections within the Ministry of Children and Family Development, Children and Youth with Special Needs, and Early Childhood Development branches
- Contact with staff within Ministry of Health, Health Human Resources; Ministry of Education; Ministry of Advanced Education
- Collaborative practice with the Provincial Advisors for Infant Development, Aboriginal Infant Development, Supported Child Development, and Children First
 - Provincial Advisor Teleconferences
 - Joint presentations to MCFD, and Nursing Support Services Conference
 - Participation on Provincial Steering Committees for IDP and SCD

- Participation in the Partnerships Project Proposal
- Communication with Paediatric Therapy Councils
 - Participation on teleconferences of each of the OT Council, PT Council and SLP Councils
 - Therapy Council representation on PPTC Steering Committee monthly teleconferences
- Communication with Department Heads, Clinical Fieldwork Co-ordinators, Professors at UBC School of Rehabilitation Sciences, and School of Audiology and Speech Sciences
- Attendance at Integrating Child, Youth, and Family Services Forum (November 2005, Terrace)
- Attended Partnerships Project Forum (November 2005, Vancouver)
- Communication with Professional Associations and Regulatory Colleges re: work plan
 - Representation from all groups on Advisory Network
 - Provided input into PABC Public Practice Survey for Paediatrics
 - Invitation from PABC to speak to UBC MPT students

Develop collaborative partnerships to encourage implementation of proactive and equitable human resource practices, and creation of positive work environments, in order to foster retention of paediatric therapists.

Promote Manageable Workloads for paediatric therapists by developing guidelines for caseloads and waitlists, including determination and implementation of consistent language and definitions.

Develop effective communication and networking opportunities throughout British Columbia for paediatric therapists.

Create a plan for professional development opportunities in all 5 provincial regions.

- Funding awarded March 2006.

Explore innovative student fieldwork opportunities in paediatric settings.

- Advisory Network group focusing on issues related to student engagement in paediatrics

Ensure timely communication of information between the Provincial Consultant, Steering Committee, and other relevant parties.

- Monthly teleconferences with the Provincial Steering Committee
- Monthly teleconferences with the Provincial Therapy Councils
- Bi-Annual teleconferences with BC Paediatric Therapy Advisory Network

- Work plan developed and posted on www.therapybc.ca website (June 2005)

Planned Initiatives for 2006-2007

- 1) Investigate use of Therapy assistants in paediatric settings
- 2) Deliver a professional development opportunity in all 5 provincial regions
- 3) Identify relevant factors affecting access to therapy services in Aboriginal communities
- 4) Disseminate information Promoting Manageable Workloads Guidelines
- 5) Disseminate Report & Recommendations from the Targeted Recruitment Strategies Project
- 6) Contribute to the development of Provincial Program information (brochures, Presentations, Guidelines, Program Logic Model, website)
- 7) Support the delivery of comprehensive, co-ordinated, and effective paediatric therapy services in all communities of BC

- 8) Develop stronger connections with Education and Health partners
- 9) Present recruitment board at National Conference
- 10) Engage student participation in paediatric settings
- 11) Development of the content of the www.therapybc.ca website

Recommended Strategic Initiatives for Ministry of Children and Family Development 2006-2007

The Ministry of Children and Family Development can support the recruitment and retention of paediatric therapists by championing the following initiatives:

- 1) Implement a funding allocation model for therapy resources that is sensitive to population characteristics of the diverse regions and communities of British Columbia
- 2) Support co-ordinated implementation of a wage scale that acknowledges the education, experience, and demand of paediatric therapists across employment sectors, with the goal of alleviating some current challenges with hard-to-fill vacancies. This initiative may require collaboration amongst the Public Sector Employer's Council, employers, therapists, union bargaining representatives, Ministry of Education, and Ministry of Health, in order to be successful
- 3) Resource support to implement recommendations from the Targeted Recruitment Strategies Report (ie. Provincial Systematic Recruitment Plan)
- 4) Promote Manageable Workloads for paediatric therapists as a strategy to encourage effective services for children, and retention of therapists in public practice paediatric settings
- 5) Support a provincial plan to increase the number of student seats for therapy disciplines across the province

Summary and Conclusions

My sense of the past year has been that of gathering and sustaining momentum to improve the access to therapy services for the children in the communities of BC. The 2005-2006 year has been a time of putting into action the recommendations previously gathered that focus on the key issues affecting recruitment and retention of paediatric therapists. Several key components have contributed to making this possible: the Ministry of Children and Family Development has stated an interest, and has allocated funding, to revitalize services for Children and Youth with Special Needs; the Provincial Paediatric Therapy Councils are well established to identify and communicate relevant issues; the Provincial Steering Committee for the PPTC is engaged in directing and supporting the annual work plan objectives; and, therapists across the province are participating in the process to share their clinical experiences and professional expertise.

I have particularly appreciated therapists taking time to let me know what is happening in their communities. This feedback not only shares with me the 'Spotlights on Success', but also highlights the areas where more resources are necessary to help children to participate meaningfully in their lives. Some of the topics identified from these

conversations are that some vacancies are hard to fill, and barriers and opportunities on this issue have been identified; there is a shortage of therapists across all sectors, so the competition to encourage therapists to consider working in paediatric settings is high; practicing therapists face workloads that are challenging or unmanageable; and, there is room to improve the support for therapists to network, connect, and learn with one another.

I am encouraged by the activities and achievements of the past year. In looking ahead, I think the work plan for 2006-2007 builds on this success and demands deeper communication and commitment from the paediatric therapy community to establish British Columbia as the province of choice for paediatric therapists – so that the children in our diverse communities have access to services that can help them to participate meaningfully in their lives.
